VICAR'S NOTES

As we move into March the Lent season in the Church is very soon upon us. These translated Latin words written before the 12th Century sum things up nicely:

Now is the healing time decreed for sins of heart and word and deed, when we in humble fear record the wrong that we have done the Lord.

Lent is therefore a time of preparation when in accord with this year's vision emphasis we reconcile ourselves with God, so that by Easter's glorious day we are ready to take the good news of Jesus' reconciling death and resurrection out to the rest of the world.

And just like there is more going on in a bulb when it lies under the surface of the soil before emerging to the sunshine of spring, so Lent is a time when we can do some necessary unseen work in our relationship with God in preparation for our time to sprout forth. Hopefully some of the things mentioned in these notes will help us do this.

Church Electoral Roll Revision and Notice of Annual Parochial Church Meeting – Monday 19th May

Every six years Church of England churches are obliged to renew their Electoral Roll and 2025 is one such year. Certain pre-conditions apply to enrol and these can be found on the forms which will be available from both churches from Sunday 2nd March 2025.

Loving God


We thank you for this season of Lent This time which invites us to pause and take stock

LED LIGHTING INSTALLED IN ST. LAWRENCE CHURCH

Although we have gradually changed the lighting in St. Paul's Church to LED bulbs and fittings and will continue to do so as opportunities arise, this has not been the case at the Parish Church. We were therefore delighted towards the end of last year to be given the opportunity to apply for a grant, available through the Diocese, to help churches become more energy efficient. Before applying the parish had to have completed an Energy Footprint Tool and to have registered with Eco Church – An A Rocha UK Project, which encourages parishes to work towards a bronze, silver or gold award – not easy with older buildings like ours but one we continue to pursue, under the leadership of Barbara Burton.

We are pleased to report that on this occasion our grant application was successful and in January, 2025 all the bulbs and a good many of the fittings were changed at St. Lawrence both in the Church and in the Parish Room – this requiring internal scaffolding to enable the fittings high up in the chancel to be reached. The grant covered 60% of the cost with parish funds covering the balance but the transformation by making the church lighter and brighter has been amazing and although it is early days we will be able to monitor any reduction in energy costs.



The PCC will continue to actively pursue further grant opportunities but parishioners will appreciate that this is not easy and even if successful any grant will only usually cover a portion of the cost of a project or maintenance issue, often taking several months before a response to an application is received but we can only be encouraged by the improvement at St. Lawrence.



INSPIRATIONAL WORDS – brought to us this month by Janet Mortimer Spring





Spring is my favourite season, when the earth comes alive again after the cold hard frosts of winter when everything lay dormant, and nothing appeared to be happening.

But during the winter season, nature is working unseen, preparing for the new growth in spring, when plants begin producing new shoots, erupting from the soil. Without that unseen work in the soil, new growth would not happen.

Human life has its seasons too – each of us go through times of darkness when we feel like nothing good or fruitful is happening in our walk with God and perhaps, we feel like He has forgotten us.

But God is at work unseen and unknown to us, preparing for the next season of producing fruit in our lives.





As we enter the season of Lent, this can be a time of reflection, of quietness, allowing God to search us in the stillness. To prepare us to blossom and produce fruit for him and for his kingdom here on earth.

HYMNS WE LOVE -

Through all the changing scenes of life - Paul Warren

This fine hymn is a metrical version of psalm 34, and comes from the New Version of the Psalter produced in 1696 by Nahum Tate (1652 - 1715) and Nicholas Brady (1659 - 1726). Tate and Brady were also responsible for "As pants the hart for cooling streams" and the well-known Christmas carol "While shepherds watched their flocks by night".



Both Tate and Brady were of Irish descent. Tate was the son of a Dublin clergyman called Faithful Teate. He came to England after graduating from Trinity College, Dublin, and changed his name to Tate. In 1692 he was made Poet Laureate, but in later life he fell victim to excessive drinking and ended his life in a debtor's prison. He must have been a bit of a character as he once published a cautionary treatise on *Syphilis*, or a *Poetical History of the French Disease!*

Brady was also a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin. He was appointed as personal chaplain to William III and he ended his career as vicar of Stratford-upon-Avon.

Through all the changing scenes of life, In trouble and in joy,
The praises of my God shall still
My heart and tongue employ.

Oh, magnify the Lord with me, With me exalt His name; When in distress to Him I called, He to my rescue came.

The hosts of God encamp around The dwellings of the just; Deliverance He affords to all Who on His succour trust.

Oh, make but trial of His love, Experience will decide How blest they are, and only they, Who in His truth confide.

Fear Him, ye saints, and you will then Have nothing else to fear; Make you His service your delight, Your wants shall be His care.

The original version of this hymn ran to 18 verses, but no hymnbook has ever printed it in its entirety.

This hymn is usually sung to the tune Wiltshire, which was written by Sir George Smart (1776 - 1867)when he was only nineteen and organist at St Jame's Chapel, London. Scots, are used to singing other metrical psalms to this tune, including "The Lord's my Shepherd". Smart went on to become organist at the Chapel Royal.


CHOIR NOTES

The choir and I are preparing for Lent and Easter. It's not easy when the winter bugs keep people away from choir practice and I too fell victim to that last week.

One thing I will say about Holy Week and Easter, is that on the music front it makes Advent and Christmas look a real doddle! There are lots of services, each with their own anthems, and all in the same week. I think we'll all heave a mighty sigh of relief once we get past Easter!

As this is likely my last write-up, I'll close with the following hymn verse:

Be thou my guardian and my guide, and hear me when I call; let not my slippery footsteps slide, and hold me lest I fall



STEPPING DOWN

As many of you already know, I shall be stepping down from my position of organist and choir director. This decision has come about because my mother-in-law is at the stage where Kate and I will have to go down to support her every now and then, as she is rather elderly. Kate spent a fortnight at the beginning of the year to help her, as she had fallen and fractured some of her vertebrae. Given that she could do something similar



at any time, I feel that I can't really be on call to support her whilst also running the music within our parish.

My last service as organist and choir director will be the Easter Praise service at St Lawrence's on Easter Day.

It's been a privilege to have held this position and I have had good times with the choir. Whilst the Father Willis organ at St Paul's is easily the better instrument, my favourite services have been the Evensongs at St Lawrence's. Evensong to me has an intimacy that I don't get at the other services. Quite possibly this is because I simply adore accompanying the psalms and the canticles. Anyone can play a hymn, but there's a real skill in playing the chants to accompany the psalms and canticles.

Whilst it's going to feel very odd not to have the Sunday (and Friday evening) commitment, I am looking forward to having a weight lifted off my shoulders. It varies depending on the time of year, but I probably spend a couple of hours most days at home preparing for the next Sunday's music.

My favourite piece of music to play on the Fr Willis organ is the prelude from Bach's Prelude & Fugue in G Major. I think this may well be the most sparkling piece of music I've ever played. I've also got to say that Widor's Toccata from Symphony V works very well on that organ. As soon as I start that piece, I can really feel the oomph of that organ. The Wyvern organ at St Lawrence's is a very fine instrument in its own right and in some ways is more versatile than the Fr Willis instrument.

The music I have enjoyed most with the choir is probably the John Rutter "Christmas Lullaby" that we did back in December. Other pieces that come to mind are "All in the April Evening", Praise the Lord" and "Ye gates, lift up your heads on high".

I just hope that I fulfilled the role that was required. I don't have any immediate plans for moving away, so I dare say I'll be helping out from time to time.




CHILDREN'S CHURCH

TRAVELS WITH DOROTHY LAVER - The Climb of My Life Down Under

With all the cold and stormy weather here since Christmas I was reminded about my trip "down under" in March 2018. My friend Brenda had booked a highlights of Australia holiday with a company called Just You. She passed me the details and I'd soon made my booking.

We were due to fly from Manchester to Perth WA on Wednesday evening, 27 February. We boarded the flight on time but then sat on the plane for three hours while the ground staff had to deice the wings several times!. The "Beast from the East" had



struck which resulted in our missing our connecting flight from Dubai to Perth. We were re-booked to a later flight and had a rest in a lovely hotel with the bonus of a coach tour of Dubai. We caught up with our tour group in Perth and were greeted by lovely summer weather with sun and blue skies.



There were so many highlights of the trip (Alice Springs, Uluru (Ayers Rock) Cairns, Canberra and Melbourne) but it was my time in Sydney which was the most memorable. Sydney is Australia's biggest city with the iconic Sydney Harbour Bridge dominating the beautiful natural harbour. The single span arch is the largest in the world at 503 metres long, 134 metres high and 49 metres wide. It is flanked by four towering concrete and granite pylons The weight of the steelwork is 52,800 tonnes and includes

six million rivets. The bridge was officially opened on 19 March 1932

As part of the holiday my friend had booked the Bridge Climb and not to be outdone I'd booked to do the climb too. The problem is I don't like heights! .. I'd loved climbing and scrambling in the mountains of the Lake District and North Wales years ago but was always a bit perturbed where a sheer drop was involved eg Striding Edge, Sharp Edge and Crib Goch. I'd once done an abseil but I worried about the impending climb for days before:. Why had I booked this trip? I must have been mad. There were no refunds if you changed your mind. Brenda found my concerns quite funny which didn't help.

The morning of Wednesday 14 March dawned bright and early, but I couldn't eat much breakfast. At 8.45am six of us (all ladies) walked with our guide to the Climb Base where the guide checked us in, wished us good luck and disappeared. No going back now. We joined six others and changed into blue and grey overalls. You're not allowed to carry anything with you. A detailed safety briefing followed explaining the use of the safety harness. From the very start you are clipped on to a rail by the safety harness which glides along it so you can't fall. I started feeling much calmer.

Led by the guide we first walked out in single file on catwalks below the road deck and then at the South East pylon we climbed four ladders to the start of the upper arch. We could see and hear the buzz of the traffic hundreds of feet below. I even managed to look down. We climbed up the arch on the Opera House side and the 360 degree views were fantastic. At the top we had an individual and a group photo and then crossed the spine of the Bridge to the arch on the other side and made our descent. As we climbed down the ladders a train



thundered past us only a few feet away. That was the worst moment. Then we were safely back at the Climb Base and being unhooked from the rail.. We collected our photos, a Bridge Climb cap and a certificate of completion. I'd done it.

. It was a great experience and I really enjoyed it . I felt a real sense of achievement afterwards . What had I been so worried about? Would I do it again. Definitely.

I started baking as a young child stood on a chair at the kitchen table helping my mum as she produced some delicious wares. The first thing I remember baking was coconut buns using mum's Bero baking book which I still have today.

However, it wasn't until I retired that I started baking seriously. I enjoy the creative element and find the process of weighing, mixing and stirring relaxing, not to mention the joy of tasting the result. I like to take a basic recipe and put my own take on it - some more successfully than others! But I particularly enjoy baking for other people. Since Marian and I moved to Longridge four years ago the community has been very welcoming and helpful. Baking is one way I can express my appreciation for such kindness.

Here is my recipe for flapjack, I hope you enjoy it.

Ingredients

350 gms Butter 350 gms Caster Sugar 2 TBSP Golden Syrup 400gms Oats 100 gms Plain Flour

Method

Melt together the butter, sugar and syrup.

Set aside to cool.

Mix the flour and oats together and combine with the melted ingredients.

Place the mixture in a greased and lined 1" deep baking tin (approximately 12"x 6") Bake in a preheated oven at 150 degrees fan for 40 minutes.

Allow to cool then cut into slices.

For variety I add a selection of dried fruit or chocolate chips or dip the slices in melted chocolate.



SPEEDING TOWARDS ANNOYANCE



It took me four attempts to pass my driving test. I took the first one in Wigan and was 100 metres down the road wondering why the car was so sluggish before realising I hadn't taken the handbrake off. Fail. As a result of that, and my other fails, not all in Wigan (it's not a geography thing), I don't consider myself to be the best driver in the world. I had friends at school who were good drivers. They lived on farms and were confidently driving tractors almost before they walked. Many, even before reading their first word, could back a trailer into a tight parking space at night without hesitation. That's not me. Fast and furious? I'm more last and lugubrious.

However, being Captain Slow does have its own rewards, for instance you have more time to notice things. Strange things, things that don't make any sense, things that make your toes curl and your eyebrows dance, things that make you wince and wiggle uncomfortably in your car seat, heated if you are fortunate. Things like roundabouts.

The internet will tell you that roundabouts have been about for over a century, but in the beginning, they were only in big cities like Paris and London and New York. They only became fashionable in the 1990's when the government introduced a breeding programme and released a mating pair to Milton Keynes. Since then, they have thrived, proliferating and diversifying, adapting to other countries in Europe, such as the Netherlands and France. They have also found a footing further afield and boast an intercontinental variety which are comfortable in Australia and the US. Larger, double lane and turbo varieties have since been bred to cope with the increase in traffic volumes, while here in Longridge, over time, the community has adopted five, that are distributed fairly around the town

Arguably the busiest of these is at Stonebridge and to my mind it has been there for as long as I can remember, maybe not as long as you can remember. It was here, driving slowly, that I first noticed a very strange thing. As the car in front of me turned left off Whittingham Lane onto Derby Road, the car coming from Preston Road, rather than slowing down for the roundabout, accelerated onto it and across it, while at the same time blaring the horn in annoyance.

The question popped into my head, why would you rush into irritation? Why speed toward agitation? What pent up frustration and anger is vented by a heavy foot and a hapless Hyundai? I have no answer, but I do know that having noticed the phenomena once, I have, in the space of two weeks, noticed it three times, in three places, it's not a geography thing. Maybe it isn't even a driving thing.

Perhaps it is simply the residue of rage that is accumulated in our over busy, over stressed lives and the ubiquity of roundabouts offer a not so safe space for therapy. As we move into the season of lent, which is a time of reconciliation, I wonder if a good place to start restoring harmony, to discover our inner and outer peace isn't so much in church, but on our roundabouts?
